There are over 100+ health related Waitangi Tribunal claims currently before the Tribunal. These are instances where the health system has failed Māori and breached te Tiriti. The social and cultural costs of this failure are significant to all New Zealanders.

This webinar will revisit why we should care about te Tiriti and will clarify current thinking in relation to the distinction between te Tiriti, the Treaty and the Crown-defined Treaty principles.

This session will offer ideas about how to work with the articles of te Tiriti and encourage you to take action to uphold te Tiriti and challenge institutional racism within your sphere of influence.

Te Tiriti is a collective responsibility for all health workers to engage with if we are going to end breaches of te Tiriti and achieve health equity in our lifetime.

## Webinar presenter – Dr Heather Came-Friar



Dr Heather Came is a seventh generation Pākehā New Zealander who grew up on Ngātiwai land. She has worked for nearly 25 years in health promotion, public health and/or Māori health and has a long involvement in social justice activism in Aotearoa New Zealand. Heather is a founding member and co-chair of STIR: Stop Institutional Racism, a fellow of the Health Promotion Forum, longstanding member of Public Health Association and an active member of Tāmaki Tiriti Workers. She currently embraces life as an activist scholar. She was lead author of Te Tiriti-based practice in health promotion (2017) and has led shadow reports to various United Nations human rights committees around institutional racism. She is a Senior Lecturer based in the Taupua Waiora Māori Health Research Centre within Auckland University of Technology.
